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## CA Assembly Bill AB 702 Seriously Impacts Responsible Dog Breeders Your Prompt Attention is Needed

On February 16, 2021, an onerous bill was introduced in the California Assembly to regulate all individuals who breed a dog in the state. What's involved?

- A permit would be required for any person who owns, possesses, or harbors an unaltered dog or cat for the purpose of breeding. It is assumed this would include stud dogs and dogs being kept temporarily for breeding.
- When applying for a breeder permit, an applicant must provide extensive information, including:
  - "A complete description of the nature and extent of the breeding to be conducted," although it is unclear what this would entail.
  - A statement that the applicant owns the dogs and that there are no other owners. If the applicant is not the owner, they must have written statements from the owners providing authorization to breed the dogs. It is assumed this would also apply to co-ownership situations.
  - Evidence that the dam to be bred is between two and seven years of age. AKC opposes this arbitrary provision, as the appropriate age for breeding can vary widely between breeds and individual dogs.
  - Any other information required by the jurisdiction issuing the permit. This provides for more onerous and unnecessary regulations on breeders that could vary in each jurisdiction.
- In addition to the application, a breeder must provide "sufficient proof" (as defined by each jurisdiction) of such items as:
  - A local business license and federal and state tax number. This is inappropriate for hobbyists
    raising animals in their private home, particularly those who breed only an occasional litter.
  - Proof of an adequate shelter, including access to an enclosed yard or other open outdoor space. It is unclear how this would be enforced in urban areas.
  - Proof that no offspring have been sold until they are 8 weeks old and have been vaccinated against "common diseases." It is unclear if this would include vaccines which are not given at 8 weeks of age.

## 2020 Agility Trial at Rancho Murieta

One of the most prominent Agility events in California is the three-day all-breed trial sponsored by the PWDCNC, held every November at the Murieta Equestrian Center. The most recent trial, held on November 21 - 23, 2020, was remarkable because it was the only event of any kind that the club was able to hold during 2020 after the Annual Meeting, due to the ongoing pandemic. Lorie Abbott's Abba Dogs did an outstanding job as trial secretary and organizer, providing a safe and welcoming environment for the trial.

Seven of our club members exhibited their dogs during the event. Other members that contributed their services toward having a successful event were Ron and Barb Avila (rings and timers) and Kathy Weinberg (PWD Awards). The Judges were Jeff Ipser and Carol Curtiss. There were 1031 registered entries in the four main trial categories:

- 362 STD (Agility Standard)
- 381 JWW (Jumpers with Weaves)
- 182 FAST (Fifteen and Send Time)
- 106 T2B (Time 2 Beat)

These categories are divided into classes at various levels of expertise. Also, there is an additional, parallel set of "Preferred"

categories to accommodate dogs with special needs; these are designated by the prefix "P". An excellent, though somewhat dated, primer on the essentials of agility is available on the AKC website <u>here</u>, and a full description may be found in the AKC Agility manual <u>here</u>.

The table on the next page lists the qualifying scores obtained by PWDs. The full set of results is currently available on the Abba Dogs website <u>here</u>.

Several PWDs obtained titles at the trial. They included Jenna Bullis's Keeva (Excellent FAST), and Bobbi (Open FAST). Meg O'Hair earned a title with Surfer (Novice PJWW), and two with Sailor (Open PJWW and Novice PFAST).

In addition to the 3 titles, Meg's Sailor received High in Trial —an award offered by the PWDCNC. According to Agility Chair Kathy Weinberg, "High in Trial is specific to PWDs entered. It is a bit complicated, but basically boils down to points being given for scores in each run that qualifies. Included in the calculation is the level of difficulty, *e.g.*, Novice gets fewer points than Masters. We typically only offer high in trial at the November trial, and it is a cumulative score for the first two days of the trial." Congratulations to Meg and Sailor for winning this very special award!

## **A Bit More Breed History**

## PWD Pioneers: Sonja and Jim Santos

Our brief history of PWDs coming to Northern California needs to include a reference to Sonja and Jim Santos, who bought their first PWD, Fado, in 1962 from the Houghtons in New York. Sonja told the New York Times reporter [1] in 1983 that she thought the total population when they got Fado was approximately 8 in the United States, 1 in the Lisbon zoo, and 14 others spread about. By 1983 she estimated their population had increased to about 800 in the U.S., approximately 40 to 50 in Portugal, 25 in Italy, and a few in Germany, England, and Norway. Fado convinced Sonja that the breed was so special it needed to be preserved. Jim and Sonja imported two bitches in 1975 and 1976 [2]. The first one was black, Zingara, and the second one was brown, Alvorada de Alvalade from Dr. Cabral and the Alvalade Kennel. The Santos kennel was called do Mar. They worked hard to preserve a deep brown color and white markings as well as to eradicate hip dysplasia. Kathryn Braund commented that the Santoses were cautious breeders who bred nicely balanced dogs. Several of our club members got to know Sonja and Jim. Becky Morin purchased her third PWD, Corrie, from them in 1990. Judy Seibert gives them credit for being her mentor and thereby becoming close friends. The Santoses paid a visit to Judy and her husband, Dick, in 1995, who took the Santoses to Glacier and Yellowstone National Parks. Judy recollects that "being died in the wool New Yorkers, they were totally overwhelmed by the parks." Linda Kelly has fond memories of attending a supported-entry show in Arizona where Dog, pp 103-105.



she met Jim and Sonja, who had come to see Janis Watts, but since Janis's friend Mart was in the hospital with a serious heart attack, she and Judy Seibert had the great pleasure of showing them around the Phoenix area. Linda also commented on the Santoses attending a regional show in Oregon and how much knowledge she gained from talking with them. Sonja has not been involved breeding PWDs for 20 years, because of ill health.

Sonja was a founding member of PWDCA, served as a Director several years, and also as Vice President for several years. She audited the registry, was the assistant foreign registrar, and wrote the PWDCA policy book.

## Cheryl Smith Remembers the Early Days of Agility

PWDs have developed a lot since the inception of the PWDCNC in 1992. They are now a much healthier and more numerous breed. But many dog sports have also evolved over this nearly 30-year period. One of these is Agility. The first U.S. Dog Agility Association (USDAA) competition was in Houston, Texas, on November 8, 1986. The concept of an obstacle course for dogs was developed in 1977 at the Crufts dog show when sponsors wanted to entertain the audience between major events. The course was influenced by the equine jumpers' courses. Cheryl Smith recalls the PWD introduction to Agility: "As for Agility, here is what I remember. At the 1994 PWDCA National Specialty in San Rafael, we were the second AKC club to offer Agility. It was still very new to many of us. But we had a ton of fun trying to compete. Most of us had not done much training at that time, so the runs were rather humorous. I remember one dog running to the top of the A Frame and stopping to look at everyone; this brought a roar from the crowd. A few ran out

of the ring to the spouse of the competitor. We were still such a new club that we had fun with our mistakes. I do not think we started to offer our own agility trials until much later. I remember taking training lessons from Karen D'Augusta when she lived in Campbell. Some of the obstacles used then are not used now."



#### **Charter Member Interview with Judy Archambeau**

The show world of animals started for my husband Paul and me with our breeding and showing Arabian horses and showing a Great Dane. After trail riding as a youth, I learned to ride English style and loved showing our horse in English Pleasure classes. Paul showed him in Buggy classes. Paul showed Tasha, our blue Great Dane, who was the first Great Dane in the United States to earn a Utility title. When our second Great Dane Meghan died, I went to the Sonoma County Dog Show in Santa Rosa to see what our options would be to get our next Great Dane. Roaming the grounds was familiar because of the many times we had showed horses there. I noticed a man leading a beautiful Great Dane, as well as another dog. I struck up a conversation with him about his Great Dane and when I was about to leave asked him about his other dog, thinking it was possibly a rescue. He explained that it was a Portuguese Water Dog, and related information about this new breed. He sparked my interest in the breed, and I spent a year researching PWDs and convincing Paul we should get one. We decided to look for a black and white one. We located some nearby breeders including Lorraine Carver, her daughter Lisa Hubbart, and Becky Morin, but none of them had a parti-colored pup. Lisa gave me copies of the Courier, and through that we found Cindy McCullough and the Mariner Kennel in Houston, Texas [1]. In 1990 we bought a pet quality pup named Monte from Cindy. He turned out to be a very calm dog; so calm, that other PWD owners teased us about him at training events. "Was he really a PWD?"

We really enjoyed the dog shows. They offered the same camaraderie we had experienced at the horse shows. At the early agility matches a lot of us chipped in to set up the courses. Monte sold us on Portuguese Water Dogs. We liked his size, appearance, intelligence, mischievous attitude, and friendly temperament, as well as the fact that he did not shed. In 1995 Lisa Hubbart called to say "I have your puppy," so BISS INT'L & AM Ch Alto Mare Rainha Marcella 2xAOM ROM CD OA NA JWD TDI (Marcy) came to live with us [2]. We needed to get someone superb to groom and handle Marcy to advantage in conformation. That is how we came to know Sally George [3], who handled her. Marcy was Best of Breed at the first PWDCNC Regional Specialty in 2002. In addition to conformation, Marcy also completed a beginning therapy course. At that time, the IABCA (International Dog Shows) sponsored shows in Northern California in Vallejo, and Marcy showed there. Marcy's son Zorro achieved 100 Best of Breed awards, but Marcy won over him at a Cow Palace show. Marcy also was the first to win Best of Breed out of a Veteran class at the first PWDCNC specialty



show in Pleasanton. We sold one of Marcy's pups to Jean and Bob Combs and received a return puppy, Breeze, Ch Baymist Capricious Breeze BN CD RE [2], a black and white bitch. Breeze was Sweepstakes Best Veteran and Best Veteran in Specialty at the 2011 PWDCNC Regional Specialty. We remember Breeze as loving, loyal, and intelligent, as well as obedient with a strong desire to please. It is amusing in retrospect to remember the one great temptation that she could not resist. That was to run off to the horse pasture to eat and roll in the manure. Green manure on a white ruff certainly presented a grooming challenge.

We named our kennel Bela Vista.

The club deserves a great deal of credit for the emphasis placed on breeding practices working to identify genetic traits. Gradually DNA tests have been developed to assist in avoiding some of the significant health issues.

#### **Charter Member Interview with Sherry Hanen**

The charter member recollections in the previous two newsletters have been so informative, and it has been fun to read the perspectives each person has on the Club's beginnings. I see the whole thing quite differently and through my personal perspective you may find the Club's origins more intricate than you had imagined.

Our first PWD came to us in the summer of 1987 from Maryanne Murray (Brinmar Kennel). Here's how it happened. I had lost my little mixed-breed love dog – he was a cockapoodlespringer that looked like a parti Miniature Poodle on long legs! He was with me from Graduate School in Hawaii to five years in Washington, DC, and then back to California; over fifteen and a half years of love! When I lost my Eli, I knew I wanted a dog smart enough to compete in Obedience work, nimble enough to enjoy romping and playing (remember there was no Agility back in the "old days"), and simply a love! I researched various breed characteristics, subscribed to dog magazines, and went to dog shows to refine my search. I had competed in obedience in Hawaii with Eli, where he was a "poi dog" – mixed breed and they had a class for poi dogs – but I knew in order to really compete, I would need a purebred dog (There was no PAL program in the "old days"!) I met Marie West at a show, and she introduced me to her PWD, Star, who kayaked with her. I was impressed. I wanted a dog that did not shed (Eli had spoiled me), and one that I could pick up and carry if necessary (Eli had a back problem in his later years, and since we had a two-story house, we needed to carry him up the stairs sometimes). I narrowed my search and the final contenders of course included PWDs. I visited a litter in San Jose, and was not impressed. One of the magazines had dog ads and I saw an ad for a litter of PWDs in Pennsylvania.

I had a work trip planned to Princeton, NJ. Since it was summer my husband Ken Jones, who was a teacher, was free and decided to accompany me as a tourist. After I finished my work on Friday, we rented a car and drove to Pennsylvania where we had arranged to meet the breeder on Saturday. We came home with a babe! Ken had packed a small carrying case and old towels inside his suitcase, just in case! I was really impressed when I learned later that the breeder, Maryanne Murray, was the PWDCA President at the time and most of the dogs on the pedigree were noted and pictured in the PWD book (*The Complete Portuguese Water Dog*, by Kathryn Braund and Deyanne Farrell Miller) – we were in it for real, we thought! And Maryanne shared my enthusiasm for Obedience and other competitions. She had a sort of rebate program in her contract. For every AKC title earned (at either end), she gave back a portion of your purchase price – I was even more impressed now! Our first PWD was well balanced. He had titles at each end of his name.

Little did we know that PWDs are such a special breed – they need extra love, care, understanding, a sense of humor, and a TON of patience and skill! We made sure we continued going to dog shows to meet other PWD people, and soon we had a list of folks to call upon when we had questions or concerns. We began to get together at the shows to chat, share lunch, and exchange stories of our dogs' exploits and the mistakes we were making along the way. We soon realized that what we needed was a support group – perhaps a 12-step program – some way to understand and make sense of our new passion, PWDs. And that, my friends, is how our Club was founded – because we needed a support group!

There was a point in our early years when we realized that we spent a lot of time eating together and sharing stories about our dogs – we even had a T-shirt that read "An Eating and Drinking Club with a dog problem...."

In the beginning we did not have the good fortune to have available DNA tests to identify the recessive genes causing the many scourges of our breed. My first boy turned out to be a hairloss dog. Going to Obedience competitions meant I had to carry a note from a vet declaring that his skin condition was not contagious, just so I could get into the ring. He actually finished his Championship before there was any hint of his follicle abnormality. (Note: he was never bred.) Our next PWD was a girl, Miss Muffie, Queen of the Sofa! Muff was born prior to the development of a DNA test to identify dogs who were PRA carriers and lo, she developed PRA and was blind for about half of her 15 ½ years. She never missed a step (or a meal). At a time when we had two boys and Miss Muff, she proved how regal she was and never let a boy on the sofa! That earned her the Queen appellation! She also hated any ring appearance (Obedience or Conformation). We showed her at the National Specialty our Club hosted in 1994. Ken took her into the Obedience ring without having worked with her very much at all! Well, the Obedience judge was our own Karen D'Augusta. Ken very proudly walked down the ring with Muff in heel position. Once off leash while Ken walked, Muffie slipped behind him, exited the ring, and squatted to pee! He never knew it. In the same heel pattern on the way back, she exited the ring, pooped, and rejoined as if nothing had happened. At that point, Karen stopped him and explained why she had to excuse him from competition. His response: "Well, she never fouled the ring."

On another of Ken's forays into the world of dog competition, he decided he could show Miss Muffie in Conformation! Of course, he did not attend any of those classes either. But he wanted to give it a go, so we entered a show, and on the appointed day we packed up for the short drive to the San Mateo Expo Center. There were many PWDs entered, and Ken took a nicely coiffed Miss Muffie out where the others were gaiting their dogs for warm-up. An exceedingly kind lady came over and suggested that she would be happy to give Ken a few pointers before entering the ring. Ken, the teacher, was also a particularly good student, and he watched and listened intently. Then he tried it himself, and a bit later they went into the ring. The kind lady was Becky Morin, and she too was in the ring showing her own PWD, as were a few of her "puppy people." Ken and Muffie did not shine but they tried hard. Later in the afternoon, Becky was rounding up people to take a group photo. Ken jumped up and said he was ready. When he returned, I asked why ever in the world did he go to a photo shoot of Becky's all-related dogs? He assured me it was fine – and it was fine with Becky, although I am sure she had to explain many times why there was an interloper who photobombed their family portrait!

Then there was the 1994 National Specialty – we were a VERY young club, barely two years old. There were not many members, but most were dedicated and very hard working. A group of us went to the first ever National Specialty in New Jersey. We put on an open house sort of affair to meet the East Coast people and enlighten them about Northern California. We brought our finest ingredients to make guacamole and chips, as well as other California delicacies like artichokes. We actually brought chips on the plane; what were we thinking? That they did not have chips in New Jersey? We brought name cards for our doors to show everyone who we were and inviting them to introduce themselves! But most importantly while we were there, we got the bug! The bug to put on a National Specialty right here in Northern California! And when we got home, we started to work on it!

Several PWDCA Board members were planning to come to California in 1993, so we invited them all to a cocktail party at the hotel hosting the dog show in Santa Rosa. We pulled out all the stops – we wanted to make an impression so solid that they would have to select our Club to host the 1994 Specialty!

We were successful in getting their attention and their votes. Soon we began to pull it all together. Our big fund-raising start was when we auctioned off two PWD Christmas ornaments at the Holiday Party and earned a whole \$35. That was our initial war chest for the 1994 National Specialty – oh how things have changed!!

Our 1994 Specialty had many firsts – first Specialty on the West Coast, first AKC Agility trial west of the Mississippi – second agility trial anywhere in the U.S. The highlight of the Agility trial was when Jerry and Nedra Adams' Mex/AM Ch Roughrider Isabela Ensopada CDX OA PC went to the top of the A-frame and looked out at the crowd! The crowd cheered (no one had ever seen Agility before after all). The dog got an immediate reward for her effort – there was applause, there was laughter, there was near hysteria as Jerry pleaded, "Isabela, come down" and the mightily pleased dog remained forever on the top of the A-frame! Significantly – this was the first time Superdog was awarded - we actually thought it up as a sort of funny reprise, nothing at all serious, just for fun!!! Isabela was that first Superdog, the dog at the top of the A-frame! There were other firsts. For the first and only time one dog won both High in Trial Obedience and Best in Specialty Show, Emmy Verkozen's Ch OTCH Alto Mare Gambol N Man UDX5 TD NA (Gammy), and they went home with most of the trophies from the show. Our Water trial for that first Specialty was at China Camp, a tiny area in the San Francisco Bay that once was home to a Chinese community of fishermen. There remained a dock and small cafe with a narrow beach area and a far too small parking lot. The water is brackish as it contains both Bay and river water. Folks inquired about sharks. We do not really have a shark problem inside the Bay, but we assured them that we would have a shark patrol ready. Since there was only a far too small parking lot nearby, we enlisted Club members (thank you Gary Masamori and Chuck Teasley) to drive a rented bus laden with people and dogs back and forth from the host hotel to the water trial site, all day long. We assured the cafe owner that we would need LOTS of lunch food for the crowd! Our biggest problem was trying to plan the trial around the ever-changing tides! But it was a first - a water trial in the U.S. in almost salt water and no sharks!

Our Club and the breed have come a long way since those days. We have new tests to abate the serious diseases/conditions that afflicted our original PWDs, we have Water trials held throughout the U.S. hosted by various clubs, our Club sponsors Agility trials annually, and we have a National Specialty that is a thing unto itself – with a myriad of events, seminars, meetings, merchandise, mega fund raising, and competition in every venue – and Superdog is a THING, no longer a funny little escapade.

Still the VERY best part of any of these activities is that it brings our people and our dogs together in so many ways. Together to relive the dogs' history through the Water trial exercises. Together to learn more about PWD health, breeding, training, and general welfare. Most important, it brings us together to share our experiences, our problems, our training strategies, and our successes because after all, why did we come together at the onset if not because we sought support, camaraderie, and the friendship of likeminded PWD enthusiasts? Indeed, a support, self-help group!

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
## Antics, Adventures, and Awards



## Leptospirosis

Every year, dogs in many areas contract the bacterial infection Leptospirosis. This is especially true for dogs that are around other dogs, in settings such as dog shows, performance trials, dog parks; the list is never-ending. Other risk factors are dogs that frequent outdoor areas visited by wildlife. Given the increasing incidences of encountering wildlife in urban areas, even the city is not off-limits for the risk of this potentially fatal and often debilitating bacterial disease.

Why is this important information to PWDCNC members? According to the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), Leptospirosis bacteria are often encountered in contaminated water. Our dogs by nature are drawn to water in all forms, and frequently swim and/or do water work. Additionally, our multitalented breed often competes in many venues with other dogs.

What is Leptospirosis and how is it contracted? "Lepto" is a bacterial infection contracted by coming in contact with water contaminated by the urine of rats, deer, raccoons, skunks, opossums, and even squirrels. Some forms of the bacteria can penetrate directly through the skin, for instance, when a dog is wading or swimming. Dogs can also contract Lepto from asymptomatic "carrier dogs" that have recovered from the disease but continue to carry the bacteria. Leptospirosis is also a "zoonotic" threat in that it can be spread from dog to human.

What are the signs of Leptospirosis? The onset of infection and clinical signs can be about four to twelve days from the initial exposure. Dogs may have a high fever, loss of appetite, fatigue, and small bleeding spots in the mouth, eyes, or skin. Bloody diarrhea or vomiting may also be present. Perhaps the most concerning is the chance for



liver and/or kidney failure. Almost all cases require a hospital stay, and in the case of kidney failure dialysis may be required; even if performed, the dog may be left with chronic kidney disease.

Clearly, keeping your dog from contact with the bacteria is the best prevention. However, with our water-loving pups and their frequent participation in venues with other dogs, that is easier said than done. That, along with the wildlife rich California environment, makes it a challenge to keep your companion Lepto free. However, there is a vaccine available, and while no vaccine is 100% effective, it is definitely worth considering. Have a conversation with your veterinarian to determine if your dog should receive the Leptospirosis vaccine.

That ounce of prevention may well save a heartache later.

## A Reminder about Rattlesnakes

Spring is bursting out all over! Lockdown or not, nature calls, and resisting a walk on trails in open spaces with your PWD may prove impossible. Do not forget that it is not only flowers that you may see. In the Lamorinda area a brazen coyote has come behind a Lafayette grocery store to bite a person eating his sandwich outside. The same animal bit a child while the child and its mother were walking near the Lafayette Reservoir. You most likely will not encounter this unusual behavior from a coyote, but not far from most city limits (or even within them) you could very likely encounter a rattlesnake awaking from its brumating nap and looking for a partner. It's important to be very vigilant. You may also want to consider immunization for rattlesnake venom or rattlesnake aversion classes. We recommend rereading the Wavies & Curlies article on rattlesnakes, available on the Club website (April 2018 issue, pages 9-10).
