
Reflections from Past President Bill Waters

The Club's First FCAT Trials Leone Equestrian Center, October 2-3, 2021

The Club's first FCAT Trials took place on a beautiful early fall weekend on October 2–3 at the Leone Equestrian Center near Sacramento. It was organized by Janis Welsh, and was carried out by Janis and her band of volunteers, with equipment, expertise and secretarial services supplied by Abba Dogs.

Janis sends special thanks to the volunteers, Meg O'Hair, Ann Gaskell, Frank Dietrich, Sue Pemberton, Melanie Groth, and Chris Welsh.

A good short description of FCAT (a.k.a. Fast CAT) can be found in the September, 2021, issue of Wavies & Curlies.

These were All-Breed trials, and among the entrants were 9 PWDs. While initial entries looked low, there were many day-of-trial entries, which were sufficient for the event to make a bit of money for the Club. Each dog runs twice; there were approximately 200 runs over the course of the two days.

In Janis's opinion, the best thing about the weekend was that several people who had never done *any* performance events with their dog came out and were successful. Typically, the new dogs were dubious about chasing a bunch of plastic bags and had to be laboriously cajoled down the course. Then, often during the second run, they "got it" and were off and running. It was great fun to see the moment of enlightenment!

This was a wonderful weekend, and several titles were earned.



We had an excellent turnout: over 71 PWDs, creating over 90 entries. Seeing breeders and longtime owners share their enthusiasm and knowledge with the newer folks was really a joy!

Our Show Chair Janis Welsh and her band of volunteers did an exceptional job of putting on a very smooth-running show with a bit of something for everyone. They succeeded in the face of exceptional challenges by the continuing pandemic, including the necessity of holding the afternoon social event outside. Fortunately, we were blessed with a warm and beautiful day, somewhat uncommon in mid-November Napa.

Many of the volunteers responsible for the Specialty's success are noted in the descriptions of the events below. Everyone was willing to jump in and help wherever needed, including Jeannie DeNardo Stark, Lew and Casey Ingram, and many other Board and Club members.

Most attendees' first stop was at the Club table, where Margaret Dietrich welcomed them, issued catalogs, and sold tickets for the basket raffle.

The Health Tent returned to our Regional Specialty this year, coordinated by Julie Conger with the assistance of wonderful volunteers Kate Twain, Bonnie Alonso, and Carole Corbett. After

securing a \$2000 grant from GoodDog.com (whose mission is to promote responsible and ethical dog breeding and health promotion), Julie and her team were able to provide discounts to Club members for several types of genetic and DNA tests. The team collected samples for these tests from 21 dogs that the participants could then send to the appropriate labs for analysis.

Canine Good Citizen and Trick Dog evaluations were carried out by Ally Lantis and her assistant Lew Ingram. In all, 9 Canine Good Citizen and 1 Canine Good Citizen Advanced titles were gained, along with 6 Trick Dog Novice and 1 Trick Dog Intermediate title. The pass rate was an exceptional 100%. It was so great to see the dogs and owners working together!

The Regional Specialty would not be the same without the Parada dos Amigos. The Parada, emceed by Dominick Amadeo (as only he can!), featured a wonderful group of 21 dogs, young and old. And Karen D'Augusta was our honorary steward, who handed out the ribbons. What a great experience for their owners to show them off in the ring!

PWDCNC's Second Annual Scent Work Trial Lodi, December 19, 2021

On Sunday, December 19, 2021, the PWDCNC held its second annual AKC Scent Work trial. The trial was held at Dream Big Training Center in Lodi, California.

Scent Work is a sport where dogs get to do what they do all the time, use their amazing noses to smell. The dog works with its handler, usually its owner. Together the dog and handler search for certain scents, depending on the trial.

The scents that the dogs are searching for can be birch, anise, clove, cypress, or the scent of their handler on a cotton sock, cotton ball, or cotton swab.

The dog searches for the odor specific to the trial. When the dog finds the odor, they alert the handler. The handler then yells "alert!" so the judge knows they found something. Hopefully the dog has found the correct place where the odor is.

The classes are Handler Discrimination (HD), Container, Interiors, Exterior, and Buried. The levels are Novice, Advanced, Excellent, Masters and Detective. As the team advances, winning titles, each level gets harder and more challenging.

Our judges were

Suzanne Edholm judging Novice Container, Novice Exterior, Advanced Container, and Advanced Exterior;

Patti Garcia judging Novice Interior, Advanced Interior, and Excellent interior; and

Lisa Kretner judging Novice HD, Novice Buried, Excellent Container, and Excellent Exterior.

A trial of any kind needs volunteers to help run the trial. Special thanks to Lew Ingram who did not compete with a dog, instead spending the entire day volunteering.

Most dog and handler teams competed in multiple classes. When they weren't with their dog or dogs, they were volunteering for different jobs on a revolving basis. Thank you all for your help and support.

AKC Scent Work is fun to watch, even if you have never seen the sport before. Spectators are normally allowed, which is always fun, but due to Covid, were not allowed at this trial. Trials can ALWAYS use volunteer help, for a few hours or for the entire day. Volunteering allows you to see what the dogs can do using their noses; how the handlers "read" their dog (i.e., know that the dog is letting the handler know they have found the correct odor), how the different dogs alert their handlers that they found something, and just how they search.

There are always lots of different odors in the air. We can't smell them but the dogs can. AKC Scent Work training enables

the dog to pick one specific scent out of the air that they find interesting, and follow that scent, in the air, to the item they are looking for. Once their already excellent noses are trained to find specific odors, it is fun to watch them in the house, in the yard, on a walk, or in the water, when they search for an odor and item they are interested in. You can create your own games, like hiding a specific toy and asking your dog to find it.

I love to watch Teddy searching for his special toys. Teddy likes to throw his toys either up in the air or away from him. Sometimes he loses them, especially balls. He will either find the toy himself or come to me for help. I tell him to search for the toy and, together, we walk around the area where he was playing. He is using the skills he has learned in AKC Scent Work.

Thank you to our club members who spent the day volunteering (Lew Ingram) or volunteering and running dogs (Kathy Souza, Susan Craig, Elaine and Chris Rasmussen, Casey Ingram, Don Niemann and Ann Gaskell).

Our third annual AKC Scent Work trial will be held on Sunday, December 18, 2022, again at the Dream Big Training Center in Lodi. We look forward to seeing you there!

Insulinoma, Diabetes, Insulinoma

INSULINOMA

In December, 2018, my boy Quiznos began to experience what appeared to be seizures. I made an appointment with a neurology specialist after my regular veterinarian referred me, indicating that seizures needed the attention of a veterinary specialist. After a thorough neurologic exam, the vet neurologist came into the exam room and shared that Quiz showed no neurologic deficits, whereupon he promptly had a seizure in the office.

With that, the specialist agreed that we had to do something to stop the seizures and was about to start him on anti-seizure medication when she said the better course of action was to do a more thorough search to see if there were any indications of what was really happening to him. Blood work showed that he had seriously low blood glucose. (Hypoglycemia is known to cause seizures, tremors, dizziness, etc., and can be fatal.)

At that point an internal medicine specialist took over and suggested even more tests to discern the cause of the hypoglycemia. It turned out his insulin level was very high, and his glucose level was very low. This indicated that his pancreas was not up to the task of regulating insulin production based on glucose levels. The most suspicious cause for this was a tumor on or in the pancreas, i.e. pancreatic cancer. The basic confirmative test was a glucose/insulin ratio. The following standard diagnostic is a CT scan followed by an ultrasound to see if a tumor is visible. This step confirms the presence of a tumor and its size and location. The CT scan showed nothing. It was suggested that we not do an ultrasound, as that too might be inconclusive. However, nothing other than a tumor would be the most logical cause of the symptoms we were seeing. The true diagnostic test is exploratory surgery to find and remove the tumor when found. Note that it is the β cells in the pancreas that produce insulin and those same β cells make up the tumors, so the tumor-burdened pancreas becomes an insulin producing machine.)



I was told that the CT and ultrasound are often negative because the tumor may be on the opposite side of the pancreas, hiding behind another organ. By the second week of January, Quiz was in surgery, and a tumor and a portion of his pancreas were

removed. The surgeon reported that he had small metastases on his liver as well; however, no evidence of metastasis was seen in the lymph nodes. At this point it was clear that he had insulinoma.

After surgery we were assigned an oncologist to help us move through this diagnosis and keep the boy



comfortable and as capable of resuming normal life as possible. The oncologist shared how rare insulinoma is, and that there are no drugs dedicated to prevent, treat/manage or cure this condition. That said, he did have several recommendations and some expectation that we could hope for more time together. His prognosis for Quiz was six to eight months. I told him that Quiz and I intended to participate in the entire water season so he would have to exceed the prognosis.

Helping your dog navigate life with insulinoma is a trying experience. Insulinoma is a pancreatic cancer. You may recall from high school biology that the pancreas is responsible for manufacturing and dispensing/regulating insulin**. A tumor on the pancreas (insulinoma) can cause the pancreas to go "out of order;" the surgery to remove the tumor can do the same.

When insulin regulation is "out of order," the body is left with either too much or too little glucose (hyperglycemia or hypoglycemia, both very dangerous situations). Human Type 1 diabetics test their glucose levels and administer insulin as required to regulate their glucose levels in safe zones. When your dog has diabetes, you will need to do the same for them.

At the time Quiz was diagnosed I started research and review of the relevant literature, searching for any hope, any new ideas that I should bring to the attention of my oncologist. During my search I found that at that time, there were known to be four (Quiz included) PWDs with insulinoma. Two of us had the tumor removal surgery and the other two did not. Without surgery, the dogs rely on medical management of the symptoms of the disease (See Resources for more links to information).

DIABETES

Recovery from surgery was uneventful. But by May Quiz' blood work showed that his glucose levels were getting too high. Surgery on the pancreas had irritated that organ enough that it stopped producing insulin. Quiz was now diabetic. Dogs are Type 1 diabetics, since their bodies are not producing enough insulin, and so we need to give them what the body is not providing. They require insulin, twice daily at 12-hour intervals, and the insulin must follow a full meal. Less than a full meal requires a reduction in insulin. No treats during the day, except very specially sourced items that have no effect on glucose



levels (fresh green beans became Quiz' best treat). Finding the correct amount of insulin to give is called "regulating" the glucose. Many vets require that the patient be brought in to the office at least weekly for a full day of glucose testing (every two hours for 12 hours). The graph of these glucose levels over time is called a "curve." Regulating a dog can take many months, but because of the fragile nature of the glucose levels, it's simply a requirement in order to have any control at all over the course of the disease. Meals must be as low in fat as possible to prevent ketoacidosis, also very dangerous and painful. Meals must also be at exactly 12-hour intervals—because the insulin is a 12-hour insulin. The meals must be absolutely consistent; weighed, not measured in a measuring cup. Again, because the amount of insulin must match the amount of food given.

What does all this mean? Well, it means your life will now really revolve around your dog's meal schedule. It means accurate recordkeeping and weighing, and it means giving your dog its insulin shot twice daily. In the best scenario, you should be measuring the dog's glucose levels twice daily, before the meal and before insulin, because any number of things can raise or lower the dog's glucose level. Excitement, fear, over exertion, even changes in the weather, can make your dog's glucose level change abruptly. Then what? Giving additional insulin when the glucose level is already too low can send the dog into hypoglycemia and possibly a life-threatening situation. So, just as humans do, you need to stick the dog (with a special lancet) for a blood test using a glucometer calibrated for dogs. Depending on the actual level, you feed, and after the meal is consumed (and not thrown up after) you administer insulin as appropriate to the food/glucose measurements you have just taken. And of course, you record all of the data.

I was very new to the world of diabetes and began extensive research into dog diabetes. Turns out there is a wonderful FB group for dog diabetics (CDSI; see Resources), whose members have or had dogs with diabetes. The information found in their Guides section offers scientific articles, new products to be considered, and information from owners as to how to navigate crises. There are so many members that the FB group has very successfully established connections with manufacturers of the glucometers, lancets and many more products that will assist in managing your dog's condition. These connections bring deep

discounts and even free meters for members of the group. When I joined there were 11,000 members worldwide; as of this writing, there are over 20,000 members. The worldwide distribution is important, because this has become the go-to place when you have immediate questions/concerns about your dog. The members (administrators and moderators manage the list) will respond to inquiries and literally be up with you all night communicating over the immediate care of your dog. Yes, of course going to the vet may be imperative, but these days emergency vet appointments are not easy to come by in many areas and even when available, many of the owners of these diabetic dogs cannot afford to get to a vet for everything that may occur or do not have reasonable access to emergency vets. And finally, our local vets may be our backstop for all things medical for our dogs, but unless you have access to a diabetes specialist, many vets do not have the in-depth experience dealing with the 24 hour/day concerns that may arise. List members (who also include vets, but they are not there to give medical advice) know what they and others have tried, and what may work in your time of need and when to head off to emergency.

Quiz remained diabetic for about 18 months. Diabetic dogs are more susceptible to a variety of infections (microorganisms really like high sugar). He had an ear infection; a mass in his lower colon, just inside the rectum; an eye infection and so on. All of these were treated effectively with antibiotics.

Also, as a result of diabetes, he developed diabetic cataracts (about 85% of diabetic dogs develop cataracts leading to blindness). Quiz became nearly blind. He retained some vision. Although cataracts are easily cured with appropriate surgery, there are many considerations to review prior to going forward with cataract surgery for a dog with insulinoma. I did not elect to have the cataract surgery for Quiz. Dogs adapt very well to blindness, and I promised never to move the family room furniture. We went for walks, and he took his favorite toy to the park daily.

INSULINOMA

We adjusted our lives to diabetes. It is particularly difficult for one person to care for a diabetic dog – there are no alternatives to testing and giving meals and insulin twice daily at 12-hour intervals. You never oversleep, you never change meal time, and you generally don't have someone in the household to stand in when a crisis arises, *etc*. But of course, it is worth it to make sure that the dogs live their best lives. During that time there were no other consequences of the insulinoma – until of course there were!

Those consequences began with ever-lowering blood glucose levels. Lower levels meant decreasing the insulin given. Changing insulin doses and meals is a rigorous activity. But the decreases were gradual, until finally I could no longer give insulin as he was obviously producing insulin himself. Either the pancreas itself, or the metastases, or both were producing insulin now.

At this point the real management of insulinoma begins. This is a test of watchful waiting – watching for ANY sign of low blood

sugar. I continued testing before every meal. Some simply watch for other signs such as stumbling, lightheadedness, any disruption in the dog's normal routine. There is also a FB group for dog insulinoma, see Resources (Julie's Group). The group had about 89 members when I joined.

What do you do when low blood glucose is obvious? This is a very dynamic situation. When glucose gets too low, it is life threatening. The first most common course of action is to raise the glucose level very quickly – rubbing honey or Karo syrup directly on the gums is the first action. However, that will cause a spike in glucose and after the spike, a dramatic drop – you need to avoid that. To avoid it you give a carbohydrate and a protein to hold the glucose level. Commonly people give peanut butter (carefully not one with xylitol) on white bread, or fig newtons. More recently there are products that will enhance glucose and they include protein and carb to hold it – one product is Glucose SOS. This product is also used for highly active dogs (and there is a product for humans) to keep glucose levels safe during strenuous workouts. Unfortunately, often outward symptoms of low blood glucose do not appear until there is already brain damage from the lack of sugar.

A typical strategy to avoid low blood sugar is to feed small meals more frequently. So from two meals per day at 12-hour intervals you go to 4, 5, or 6 meals per day – and yes, throughout the night as well. This gives the body small boosts of sugar on a regular basis. One has to experiment with how many meals are required to keep the animal safe. (I did not test before each meal any longer but did test regularly and any time he seemed the slightest bit "off.") There would be no more extended times away from home and with the intensity of the scrutiny required for any sign of low blood sugar, there is really very little opportunity to leave your dog unattended. There are however some work-arounds. There are programmable automatic feeders; there are cameras to set up to keep watch over the dog assuming you can be back quickly enough to avoid serious problems.

DRUGS AND MEDICATIONS

There are drugs to try to keep the tumor at bay. The most common is Palladia. It is FDA approved for use in dogs for the treatment of Mast Cell Tumors but has many off-label uses including insulinoma. This disease is rare enough that there is not a lot of investigation into solving its cause, prevention, and cure. It's a bit of an orphan disease. There is another drug, diazoxide that is used to raise blood sugar, as it works to slow the release of insulin from the pancreas. Palladia and diazoxide are often used together. There are other less traditional things to try (mushroom mixes, etc.). There are supplements to help the liver (silymarin) and the pancreas, and there are supplements to support eye health (Ocu-glo). We tried Palladia until liver enzymes started showing adverse effects. He took Ocu-glu to maintain as healthy eyes as possible. Once cataracts are present the only resolution is surgical removal of the cataract and replacement with a synthetic lens. He took many supplements to support him in any way possible.

Quiz remained pretty stable on five or six meals per day. He did experience a couple of mild lows and the treatment plan

outlined above brought him around quickly. My shopping list always included fig newtons, honey, and fresh green beans (when my garden ran out of them). He did have one very bad low. I brought him around and a few hours later it happened again, and I brought him out again, and then more. We went off to the emergency vet and his wonderful oncologist was there at that time. When the vet called to discuss findings and plans, we agreed on a much more aggressive plan going forward to triple the diazoxide (Incidentally, this drug must be formulated and there are only a small handful of pharmacies that will formulate it. Special orders and time play into ordering this drug.) I was to go back and pick up Quiz later that day after they had enough time to confirm he was back on track and stable. I ordered the higher dose diazoxide and washed all of his bedding and fluffed his pillows to welcome him home.

And then, the oncologist called back to tell me that Quiz was now having grand mal seizures and they could not stabilize him. I would go back at the appointed time to say my good byes.

He never complained, never whined, nor sulked and never missed a meal. He kept on keeping on as long as he could. That was May, 2021 – we did make it to every water practice in 2018 and 2019 (Covid canceled 2020) and Quiz was a very happy camper about that. He did outlive his prognosis with quality.

**Insulin is a peptide hormone produced by beta cells of the pancreatic islets; it is considered to be the main anabolic hormone of the body. It regulates the metabolism of carbohydrates, fats and protein by promoting the absorption of glucose from the blood into liver, fat and skeletal muscle cells. See entry in Wikipedia.



His last dog, Zeke, had been his constant companion for the past nine years and is now firmly committed to always being by Kathy's side.

Dave's zest for life rubbed off on his many friends and associates, from those who worked with him in the Stanford Development Office to those serving on other board and fundraising efforts. He served on the Board of Directors for the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, in the Marine Reserves, and on the Foothill De Anza Community College Foundation.

Beyond his professional endeavors, he shared his passions for golf, PWDs, and traveling with his friends and family. He started golfing as early as age 7. He especially loved golfing on the Stanford course and frequented that course well into his 70s. Dave and Kathy enjoyed exploring countries on six continents. They enthusiastically entered their first PWD, Henry (Ch Nautique's Water Navigator CGC) in the National PWDCA Specialty show in Carlisle, PA, and of course were hoping for a great showing. They also had Isabel (Ch Nautique's Neta Isabel)





with them, so they entered her as well. To their surprise Isabel won BISS, overshadowing her brother. Needless to say, Dave was ecstatic. Another of their boys, Nobreza Kimlyn Champagne N Kisses (Servio) also added much joy to their lives. On another trip to the PWDCA National Specialty in Silverdale, Washington, Dave and Henry stopped at a rest stop. They heard a voice from under the hedge and found a tiny kitten. No others were nearby, so Dave collected the kitten and took it to the nearest animal hospital. The malnourished kitten was covered with fleas. Dave purchased milk and food in a nearby market and with the vet's blessings continued on the road to the Specialty with the kitten. AKC Virtual Scent Work


