





In the last two months of 2022, the PWDCNC hosted two AKC Scent Work trials. One of these trials was held at the Lutheran Church of the Incarnation in Davis on November 5, and was

chaired by Kathy Souza. The other, the third in a series that has become an annual event, was held at the Dream Big Training Center in Lodi on December 18, and was chaired by Ann Gaskell.

The November Trial

The November trial was Novice only. We had a lovely day for the trial. There was a moderate cloud cover and wind that began with a mild breeze in the morning, then picked up to a stiffer wind in the afternoon. Our venue was the Lutheran Church of the Incarnation in Davis. This was a very nice location with good parking and easy access to the various search areas.

Overall, the trial was quite a success. The trial filled up and had an excellent pass rate. There were 154 qualifying runs. Of the 66 dogs entered, 10 were PWDs with 9 handlers.

The only placement by a PWD team was the 3rd place in Novice A Exteriors by Oliver and Lisa MacKenzie. Congratulations Team Oliver!

Water Practice for Beginners

Have you been thinking it might be fun to learn some of the things water dogs did on the boats in Portugal? Well, you're in luck because PWDCNC has weekly opportunities to get your puppies and/or older dogs in water and learn to retrieve, ride boats, swim with you, and lots of other fun things.

Practice will begin June 7th. The sessions will continue up to our water trials the first weekend in October. Currently, reduced water levels in the Shadow Cliffs reservoir where we've practiced since the late 90s prevents us from using that facility. Instead, we have Wednesdays reserved at Lake Camanche east of Lodi. Lake Camanche is an extremely popular destination for campers on weekends, so Wednesday is the only day that they can provide us with access for a group of dogs.

But you can't make it every Wednesday? No problem! If you can schedule one or two lakeside practices during the summer that is plenty. Or, if you have access to a body of water more locally, that's wonderful! But remember, by far the largest part of training for water starts at home and continues there for the rest of your water career.

Wait! I don't need water? Nope, first you need some basic skills that are best trained without the distraction of water and other dogs. So, what do you need? Let's start with the exercises for the two most basic levels of water trials, which lead to a Junior Water Certificate and an Apprentice Water Dog title. The requirements for these two levels, along with the needed skills, are described below and on the following page.

To help you understand what these exercises look like in the water, visit https://blackwaterpwds.com/water/. John Brock and members of the United Sunshine States PWD Club created these videos. You can also follow John Brock on Facebook, where he has posted several videos on teaching the beginning exercises, most recently the sit and stay.

So where do you start with all these basics? See if you can find a local beginning obedience training class. Now that the COVID restrictions have lifted, many trainers and training clubs are again offering classes. If that isn't available or doesn't fit your schedule, there are many online training sites that you can use at your convenience.

Junior Water Certificate

- 25' retrieve standing together on shore, handler throws retrieving dummy 25' into the water then sends the dog to get it. The dog can be held by the collar or harness until sent for the retrieve. Retrieve must be brought to within a 2-step distance of the handler, not necessarily to hand. Handler needs to learn to throw an object 25 to 30'.
- Boat ride Handler and dog walk to and board platform on back of boat. Dog must remain under control for the 30-second duration of the ride.
- Recall to boat Handler is rowed out 60' while dog remains on shore. Dog can be held by steward with collar or harness. Handler calls dog who enters water and swims to boat.
- Measured swim Handler and dog walk into water to a depth where the dog is swimming. The
 team moves through the water for 1 minute, then returns to shore. Handler does NOT have to
 swim.

Skills needed are:


- Reliably retrieve object from a distance of 25 to 30'. Handler needs to learn to throw object that far.
- Walk together as a team off-leash.
- Recall; i.e., come when called.
- Swim together, basically the same as walking together off-leash but in the water.
- Not required but highly suggested: dog be accustomed to being held by the collar or harness to remain in place.

Apprentice Water Dog title

- Underwater retrieve standing in water deep enough to cover the dog's face up to his eyebrows, sinkable retrieving object is dropped into the water, dog picks it up and hands it to the handler. Retrieve must be to hand.
- 60' retrieve standing together on shore, handler throws retrieving dummy 60' (to the markers) into the water then, on judge's command, sends the dog to get it. The dog must remain on a stay without being held until sent for the retrieve. Retrieve must be brought to hand.
- Dummy carry, boat ride Team starts about 20' away from boat. Handler gives dog the
 dummy to carry. Team walks together toward the boat. Handler takes dummy from the
 dog either just before boarding or once dog is on the boat. Team sits on back of boat
 while it is rowed out to markers then returns. Upon return the handler leaves the dog on
 a stay, moves onto shore to a designated spot then calls the dog.
- Float line retrieve The team waits on land, without touching the dog, while the float line is rowed out to and across the area between the markers. Once the line is dropped, the dog is sent to retrieve the line to hand.
- Measured swim The handler walks into water to a depth where the dog can swim then turns toward the dog. On the judge's signal, the handler calls the dog, waits until the dog has reached him then moves through the water for 2 minutes then they return to shore together. Again, the handler does NOT have to swim.

Skills needed are:

- Reliably retrieve object from a distance of 60'. Handler needs to learn to throw an object that distance.
- Reliably hold a sit or down stay.
- Walk together as a team off-leash.
- Dog carries dummy while walking with handler.
- Recall; i.e., come when called.
- Retrieve of dropped object; i.e., an object not thrown by the handler.
- Swim together.

PWD Noses Know: An Invitation to Scent Work

So you've heard some talk about "Scent Work" and have wondered what that's all about, but didn't know who to ask. Let's look into a relatively new sport, recent to AKC, that your dog will love to jump into.

The sport evolved from the desire of pet dog owners to teach their own dogs to search for specific odors similar to professional bomb or drug detection dogs. Obviously not every dog, nor handler, is suitable to become a professional detection team. Enter Scent Work.

You know how much your dog loves to sniff — everything. Well, imagine a new game for the two of you where you encourage him to sniff and reward, yes even during competition, with toys or food, when he is successful at finding the hide. This is a whole new relationship for you and your dog. You've probably done Obedience, Rally, Agility, Water Work, in all of which you direct the dog to perform tasks. In Nose Work, you will progress to searches where you as the handler have no idea where the hide is. So you have to do the really hard part of Nose work — learning to trust and understand your dog! Best of all, no dog-training experience is necessary for the handler, and no prior obedience training is necessary for the dog.

AKC offers competitions and titling opportunities for those interested in competing with their dogs. Teams start out at the Novice levels in Containers, Interiors, Exteriors, Buried, and an additional option, Handler Discrimination. From there they





proceed through the Advanced, Excellent, and Masters Levels. Dogs who qualify 3 times at each element and level achieve a title. AKC rules are found at http://images.akc.org/pdf/rulebooks/RSW001.pdf.

If this sounds like something you would like to try with your dog, you can contact your local dog training club to see if they offer classes. You can go to https://k9nosework.com/find-an-instructor-or-class and look up names of local National Association of Canine Scent Work certified instructors in your area. Or you can explore some of the on-line learning opportunities such as offered by https://www.fenzidogsports academy.com.

Rally — Not Obedience Lite

AKC Rally is the dog sport that has taken the nation by storm. Once billed as a stepping stone to Obedience or Agility, its popularity has surpassed traditional Obedience. Rally has developed into a sport that can easily be entered by new handlers and their dogs progressing to challenging, sophisticated levels requiring tremendous training and skill. It offers both the dogs and handlers an experience that is fun and energizing. We all know PWDs need basic training to be good family members. The basics of walking on a loose leash, sit, down, and stay pretty much will get you through the Novice level of Rally.

Novice classes are all on leash with only one dog in the ring at a time. You may talk, clap your hands, and/or pat your legs to encourage your dog. A Novice course consists of 10-20 basic sign stations that the dog and handler perform. All you need is a 6-foot leash and 4 practice pylons for heeling. Rally Novice is a great place to gain ring experience and confidence for you and your dog.

Rally is a judged and timed event. Although judging is less rigorous than traditional obedience, you begin with a perfect score of 100 and the judge deducts points for things like a slow or crooked sit, a tight leash, or a lagging heel. You need 70 points to qualify, and the fastest dog wins if there is a tie.

Rally has 7 possible levels:

Rally Novice RN

Rally Intermediate RI (this is an optional titling class)

Rally Advanced RA

Rally Excellent RE

Rally Advanced Excellent RAE

Rally Master RM


Rally Choice (starting June 29, 2023)

Classes at the Advanced and higher levels are judged off leash.


Once you have achieved the Rally Excellent title, you may accrue performance points toward the Rally Championship (RACH) title.

Choice — A New Rally Class

Effective June 29, 2023, is the Choice class. All dogs are eligible to enter the Choice class. There is no jumping, and dogs are

judged off leash. The Choice class will have 15 – 20 signs from ALL levels. For more information, go to https://www.akc.org/sports/rally/.

AKC Virtual Rally

If you don't have a local dog club to join for training, you can still do Rally on your own through virtual training, home training, and then performing tests to be judged virtually and receive a Rally title. The AKC Virtual Rally Program is described at https://www.akc.org/sports/rally/rally-virtual-entry/.

These are not different titles. A Rally title earned virtually is the same as a Rally title earned in the ring.

The virtual versions of the Rally Novice, Rally Intermediate, Rally Advanced, and Rally Excellent classes are now available to participate in permanently. The competitor sets up a predesigned AKC Rally course, video records the team's performance, and submits it to AKC.

Five pre-designed courses are published on the AKC website for the exhibitor to choose from. The exhibitor will set up the course according to the instructions provided in the *Virtual Rally Guidebook*, available via the AKC Virtual Rally web page noted above.

Rally Resources

Many of your local dog clubs will offer Rally classes. If you can't find one in your area, several online Rally courses are available, such as Fenzi Dog Sports Academy or E-Training for Dogs.com. Rally signs are available for download from the AKC. You can also order laminated signs or flash cards from Amazon, J & J Dog Supplies, or snowpinedogtraining.com, to name a few.

There are several great apps to download that have all the signs, explanations, and tips for performing the signs. Check out the free K9Rally app and download it; then you will always have it handy so you can practice anywhere or anytime.

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RACH Rainha — An Interview with Frank Dietrich

Rally started as a AKC Sport on 2005. When did you start?

We started Rally with our first PWD, Toby (now GCHB Chien D'Eau Tobias De Remis RE CGC TKA BN-V), in 2014, after he had completed his GCH in Conformation. Rainha (GCHS CH RACH Claircreek Rainha Marina CD BN RM6 RAE4 CGC), our second PWD, earned her RN in 2015 at the beginning of her Conformation career, at the age of 1 year. She resumed Rally in 2019, after Conformation and motherhood, with a muchimproved work ethic.

Why did you start?

After Toby's successful career in conformation with a professional handler, we were interested in a new activity involving direct communication with our dog. After getting the RN title on our own, we started training for the higher levels with an excellent trainer.

RACH Lakecrew Order of Magellan was the first PWD to earn a RACH July 11, 2020. Rainha was the second PWD to earn a RACH. What made Rainha such a great Rally dog?

Between her first and second forays into Rally, Rainha had a lengthy career in Conformation. I think this, along with maturity, gave her the mental discipline that made her a remarkably fast learner when we resumed Rally.

What would you tell someone who is interested in starting?

If it sounds interesting, just try it! You can even prepare for the Novice title yourself using resources available on the web. If you want to go further, a good trainer or training group is important for developing good habits. And there's always an off ramp after each title if you would like to do something else. You might think about switching back and forth between Rally and Obedience, since the skills developed in one are useful in the other.



What do dog people and dogs gain (other than basic training) from Rally?

It's a wonderful way to bond with your dog and develop communication that goes both ways. Each Rally course is different, which often requires a bit of problem solving from both team members. During our pursuit of the RACH, I was surprised to find that Rainha sometimes knew that I had erred before I did.

Do you have any learning moments from your time in the ring that you can share?

Don't walk past a Rally sign, ever! This is the fastest way to get an NQ (non-qualifying score). Once, upon completion of the Master Class course I thought we had had our best run ever. Then a very sympathetic-looking judge informed me it was a beautiful run, but we had walked past the very first sign! And so a memory was made. Everyone does this occasionally, even judges and expert trainers. A good sense of humor helps; after all, there's always another day.

Salmon Poisoning Disease and Other Water-Borne Illnesses

Ann Gaskell Recounts Norman's Brushes with Salmon Poisoning

Norman was extremely food motivated. Dead smelly items were The third exposure took place in Pleasanton, at Shadow Cliffs delicacies to him. In his fourteen years of life, he managed to avoid me long enough to get three potential exposures to salmon poisoning.

In 2012 we vacationed in our cabin on the Trinity River near Lewiston, CA. A dam upstream controls the water flow levels. This year prior to our arrival, the river flow was increased, so that the water level was very high. The salmon and other fish swimming upstream to spawn were up high too. But then the water flow was decreased, and the river level went down. This fluctuation caused some fish to get caught out of the water. The first occurrence of potential exposure was when Norman found a three-foot-long salmon that had gotten stuck wrapped around the base of a large pine tree. Norman gulped down as much of the tail of this smelly dead fish as he could manage before I was able to pull him away. The second occurrence also in the spring of 2012 on the Trinity was when Norman found a "stick" and started to play with and gnaw on it. On examination I discovered this was a very dehydrated, sunbaked dead pike. In both cases I rushed Norman to the local vet. He prescribed 14 days of doxycycline. My vet in Los Altos recommended changing the length of the treatment to 60 days.

The Trinity County vet, who sees a lot of salmon poisoning in dogs, said that if a dog even licks the skin of a fish, dead or alive, they can be exposed to the parasite. He also said that once the dog eats and/or licks part of the fish, making it vomit will do no good. Salmon poisoning can be fatal to dogs if not acted upon quickly.

Regional Park during our Club's water practice. When it was Norman's turn to practice, he immediately ran out of the ring and over to what turned out to be the minimal remains of a smelly dead fish. Norman was again put on another 60 days of doxycycline.

Fortunately, Norman never showed any signs of salmon poisoning, which I believe was due to my fast action, and he had no side effects while taking doxycycline.

I recommend that you read a short article written by the Oregon Veterinary Medicine Association. The link to the article discussing the issue is the second item in the References at the end of this article. Also, do not let the nickname salmon poisoning fool you. Many other fish can transmit the disease.

So, What is Salmon Poisoning Disease?

Salmon poisoning disease is a potentially fatal condition seen in dogs that have ingested certain types of raw fish, not just salmon, found in the Pacific Northwest from San Francisco to the coast of Alaska. It is most prevalent from northern California to the Puget Sound. It is also seen inland along the rivers of spawning fish migration. Salmon disease occurs when the dog ingests a fluke, Nanophyetus salmincola. This worm's life cycle evolves through several hosts including a river snail, an anadromous fish (defined below), and a fish-eating mammal. Ingesting the snail as well as the fish may introduce the fluke to the dog. However, it is not the fluke itself, but rather the bacteria Neorickettsia helminthoeca that may infect the fluke,

that makes the dog sick. When infected the dog will become seriously ill within a few days, and if untreated usually will die within two weeks. It is important to keep track of where your dog has been and what opportunities it had to smell or eat fish or other attractive goodies. This is useful in diagnosing, because if your dog gets sick most of the symptoms for these diseases are common symptoms for other illnesses. Such symptoms include vomiting, loss of appetite, diarrhea, fever, weakness, dehydration, and swollen lymph glands. PCR testing can provide a definitive diagnosis. PCR testing (polymerase chain reaction) is a technique in which copies of the DNA/RNA sample are multiplied so there is a larger sample that is easier to study and

identify problems. Test results usually take 48 hours after the sample reaches the laboratory.

The term salmon poisoning is misleading, as the condition is equally caused by the carcass or raw fish meat of any anadromous fish. An anadromous fish is a species that lives part of its life in the ocean and then swims upstream to spawn. In the Pacific Northwest this includes not only salmon but also lamprey, steelhead, shad, sturgeon, and several other species. The disease is also not caused directly by a poison, but is rather the result of a parasitic fluke that has itself been infected with the bacteria *Neorickettsia helminthoeca* embedded in it. Once in

the dog's intestinal tract, the worm releases the bacteria, which in turn invade the liver, lungs, brain, and lymph glands. These bacteria cause necrosis (cell death), hemorrhage (bleeding), and hyperplasia (cell enlargement). If not treated promptly, death generally results within two weeks of exposure.

Treatment includes an antibiotic to kill the bacteria, a dewormer to eliminate the parasite, and in some cases fluids to combat dehydration. Dogs may develop an immunity to the exact strain of bacteria they were infected with, but unfortunately there are multiple strains, and they are not immune to the other varieties.

Other Serious Water-Borne Diseases

If you Google water-borne diseases, you will soon discover several unpleasant conditions caused by pathogens in water in addition to salmon poisoning. Some are easily treated, especially if a correct diagnosis is made early; others not so much. Four of the most common ones that occur in northern California are leptospirosis, giardiasis, poisoning from blue/green algae, and cryptosporidiosis. Two others that occur in other parts of the United States are pythiosis and schistosomiasis.

Leptospirosis is caused by the bacteria of the genus leptospira. Even when treated this can cause long term organ damage. Fortunately, there is a vaccine that is recommended. Please note that an article by Casey Ingram in the April, 2021, issue of Wavies & Curlies describes this disease.

Giardiasis is caused by the microscopic parasite *Giardia lamblia*. It is highly contagious to both humans and canines and is spread through contaminated water, food, surface sand, and fecal material. The parasite can live outside a host for a long period of time.

Poisoning from blue/green algae results when these photosynthetic bacteria build up in water. While reproducing, the bacteria produce toxins that can have severe effects on both dogs and humans.

Cryptosporidiosis is a disease caused by the microscopic parasite *Cryptosporidium*. There are several species of *Cryptosporidium*. Some infect both animals and humans. This parasite is

protected by a hard shell that makes it resistant to all disinfectants including chlorine. It causes watery diarrhea which in turn can result in dehydration. Most cases are not life threatening and symptoms are treatable.

Handlers taking dogs to areas outside northern California should be aware of a couple of serious water-borne organisms that fortunately do not exist in our area and thus may be hard to diagnose in a dog that has been exposed in other areas. They are pythiosis and schistosomiasis.

Pythiosis occurs in warmer climates where there is ample standing water, such as the gulf states of Texas, Louisiana, Florida, Mississippi, and Alabama. Pythiosis is difficult to recognize. It is caused by a fungal-like organism *Pythium insidiosum* that enters the dog through wounds or the gastrointestinal tract and produces ulcerated lesions. Red itchy lumps may be noticeable. If it takes root in the GI tract one will observe vomiting, diarrhea, and weight loss. Since the organism is resistant to many treatments, surgery may be necessary.

Schistosomiasis occurs in Texas and Louisiana. This is caused by a flat worm, *Heterobilharzia americana*, that penetrates the skin and moves to the liver through the lungs. Adults produce eggs that penetrate the GI tract, which are then are passed into water. While in the GI tract the eggs cause inflammation, which is evidenced by vomiting, diarrhea, weight loss, and lethargy. Treatment is challenging due to the lesions in the GI tract. There is an intermediate host, a freshwater snail, that becomes infected.

After a long winter making snow angels or hunkered down by the fire, it is easy for both dogs and their owners to ignore risks. After all, more dogs drown than die of these various illnesses. However, a few precautions like paying very close attention to

what your dog can and does eat or sniff, not feeding raw fish, carefully disposing of any garbage, and keeping your dog on a leash can avoid pain and expense for both you and your furry friend.

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


